





ACT Alliance is a global alliance of more than 145 churches and related organisations from over 120 countries to provide \humanitarian aid for poor and marginalized people.

ACT Alliance (Action by Churches Together)

ACT Alliance is a global alliance of more than 145 churches and related organisations from over 120 countries to provide humanitarian aid for poor and marginalized people. CARD is a permanent member of ACT Alliance, since 1st January 2010 after the merging of ACT Development and ACT International, the relief and rehabilitation wing of the world ecumenical organisations. This membership opens the opportunity for CARD and the Mar Thoma Church to become active participants and partners in developmental and relief work in India, especially in the Northern states along with other major Churches.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES

The main components of CARD activities are CARD-Care, Light to Life, Food security and agricultural development, Gender equality and women empowerment, HIV/AIDS prevention, water conservation, Biodiversity protection, Climate change, Disaster Management, Covid-19 mitigation, Community Development, livelihood support, Promotion of CBOs and Rural Products Promotion Programme (RPPP).

CARD continues its activities through different programmes and projects working in 7 states of India, including Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Odisha and Harvana.

1. CARD CARE

CARD Care is a project which encourages educational support for the poor and needy children through child sponsorship arrangements.

During the reporting year, we provided financial support for 14 students for their professional education. The CARD Care Programme aims to enable and empower children through proper education.

2. CARD-LIGHT OF LIFE

Light to Life is a project of The Mar Thoma Mission Board of the Diocese of North America and Europe, launched in October 2017. Rt. Rev. Dr. Isaac Mar Philoxenos, Diocesan Episcopa, identified the need of supporting less privileged children who were deprived of their necessities of food and education in the remote villages in different parts of India. Thus, the Diocesan Assembly held on April 22, 2017, decided to take up the project and help such children in need.



Amid many educational institutions, the socio-economic situation in remote villages of India prevents children from making use of the facilities. The lack of proper guidance, educational support, proper nutritious food and fair clothing results in discontinuing the studies. This is where the "Light to Life" involves children.





The project's children are from rural areas, slums and urban poor families, scheduled castes, and tribal communities suffering from poverty, malnutrition, poor access to quality health services, child marriage, poor school attendance, low learning outcomes, and lack of sanitation. In this context, The Light to Life programme aims at the holistic development of children in remote places in India. The programme has **1100** students in **7 states** and **8 projects** across India.

The various states in India where these projects include:

3. CARD - FRIKS

CARD - Gram Shakti CFCD Project, Kalahandi, Odisha

CARD – Gram Shakti CFCD Project, Kalahandi was launched in April 2018. The project is supported by ERIKS Development Partner. It has been three years of operation. Gram Shakti CFCD project is working in 21 inner villages of Kalahandi district of Odisha State. These villages are inhabited by people belonging to tribal and non-tribal castes (SC, ST, OBC).

The second wave of COVID-19 affected more people in the target area than the first wave. The people here were without work for a long time.

Children's education has been severely affected due to the epidemic. Despite many challenges faced during the lockdown period, the project tried to implement the planned activities to fulfil the objectives of the project.

The project has the following objectives

- Better healthcare facilities are available for the community and improved overall quality of health and hygiene
- 100% enrolment of children in School and improved quality of the teaching-learning process and overall literacy rate.
- Improved economic condition and the standard of living of the target community

by improving livelihood options through agriculture, Soil & Water Conservation and Income Generation activities.

- Independent functioning and management of CBOs and people take up leadership for the village development.
- The community is about the rights of the children and children participate in the decision-making process.
- The community is aware of the importance of protecting the environment and practising measures to address climate change issues.
- Network and linkages are strengthened and the benefits through various component-wise activities



4. RURAL EDUCATION

Khrist Seva Kendra (KSK), Kshipra, Madhya Pradesh

Khrist Seva Kendra (KSK), Kshipra, Madhya Pradesh is one of the institutions of the Christian Agency for Rural Development (CARD). It has been enlightening the surrounding villages of Indore and Dewas from the time of its inception in 1985. Even during the pandemic period, KSK has been actively involved in child development, women empowerment, health care, and agricultural activities. Today, KSK stands with a great reputation in society as a community development organization that enables people to move toward freedom and justice. Rev.Ricky J Oommen is serving as Director of KSK.

I. St. Thomas Higher Secondary School

St. Thomas Higher Secondary School is an unaided minority institution, established in 1985. It functions under the management of Khrist Seva Kendra (KSK). It adheres to providing a quality and holistic education in the rural areas of the Malwa region.





The school is persistently trying to upgrade and update to the changing times. It strives to uphold the rights of children, and provide excellent infrastructure facilities through talented and devoted teachers. The school aims to provide all students with a multi-faceted competitive curriculum that will enable the students to develop independent views, and skills and to procure the wisdom to distinguish between right and wrong.



In the academic session 2021-22, 40 teachers and 22 non-teaching staff rendered their services to the school which has classes from Nursery to class 12th. Even amidst the pandemic, 105 students were admitted to the school after the Entrance Exam and Interview. The school is equipped with facilities that include a library, laboratories, sports, games, a computer lab, a CCTV camera, an RO water plant and a smart class. The school is on a mission to enable the students to achieve holistic development.

The school promotes moral values, and fraternity and celebrates National festivals Independence Day, Republic Day, Children's Day, Teachers Day, Mother's Day, etc. Four of our students of Class XI were declared the winners at Acropolis (one of the prestigious Science College in Indore). They competed with students from various schools and colleges. A Teacher's Training Workshop was conducted for the teachers by educational experts. Mrs Reshma Susan Ricky is presently serving as the principal of the school.

II. Sarvodaya Vidhyalaya Shanthi Nagar

The Hindi Medium School at Shanthi Nagar, Dewas is situated in the midst of a slum. There are at present 125 students in this school. The students are from and around the Industrial Area of Dewas. Most of their parents work in industries as Daily Labourers.

Six dedicated teachers are imparting their dedicated services to the school. Mrs. Anita Gadge serves as the Headmistress. The school has very limited infrastructure. Still, the school has been providing excellent results. One of the students got selected to Excellence School, Dewas, which is one of the pioneering educational hubs.

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KSK Campus

KSK promotes animal husbandry and agriculture. The green campus spread over 7 acres of land promotes organic farming and animal rearing. The different varieties of birds and domestic animals have improved the magnetism of the campus.

5. HEALTH PROGRAMMES

CARD Suraksha Project

Targeted Intervention (TI) Programme is a National Health Programme of the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare functioning under the National AIDS Control Organization (NACO) and taken over by Kerala State AIDS Control Society (KSACS) since 1996. Targeted Population means the Population who have High-Risk behaviour and considered the following groups (FSW, MSM, TG, IDUs) and Migrants & Trackers coming under bridge Population. Christian Agency for Rural Development (CARD) took over Targeted Intervention (TI) Programme in 2009 and the Project was mainly focused to prevent the spreading of HIV/AIDS among female





sex workers and meanwhile controlling the HIV Prevalence in the General Community. The Project Office is functioning at Mar Epiphanios Centre, Govindamangalam Road, Kottarakara, Kollam district of Kerala.

How to implement this programme among the FSWs Community.

With the support of Trained Peer Educators selected from the FSW Community and providing the following services (IEC, Condom Promotion, make sure the Regular Medical Check-up, HIV / Syphilis Screening)

- Behaviour Modification and Risk reduction through proper counselling and awareness creation
- Referral and linkage Service to Health Facility System
- To identify new hotspots with the support of community Members
- Conducting different types of outreach programmes to reach out to the Health-related essential services among the Community Members like Health Camps, Focus Group Discussion(FGD) Demand Generation Activities (DGA) etc.
- Strengthening Outreach Activities (SOA) may be conducted in the Uncovered Project areas with the support of PRI Members, Asha workers, Health workers and
- Consider them equal to us and make sure their Health-related Needs and protect their Human Rights.
- Make sure all assigned services are provided through project core Staff and outreach Staff
- Make sure the Community Mobilization through proper training and providing Welfare measures.
- Make them happy and improve their self-esteem through the Empathetic attitude towards them and by conducting and participating in the community gatherings organised especially for HRGs and their Family Members.

Punalur, Kottarakara, Pathanapuram , Anchal, Kadakkal, Aryankavu and Kulathupuzha are the project areas. And during the project period 2021-22, our Targeted population was 866



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FSWs and provided all the services to the HRGs. The data from ICTC shows that no new HIV infections are high in Kottarakara and Punalur. During our fieldwork experience, we knew about the remote and high-risk areas on Kerala bborderAchankovil and aryankave sites.



6. AGRICULTURE & FOOD SECURITY

Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK)

The KVK scheme is 100% financed by Govt. of India and the KVKs are sanctioned to Agricultural Universities, ICAR institutes, related Government Departments and Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) working in Agriculture.

KVK, an integral part of the National Agricultural Research System (NARS), aims to the assessment of location-specific technology modules in agriculture and allied enterprises, through technology assessment, refinement and demonstrations. KVKs have been functioning as Knowledge and Resource centres of agricultural technology supporting initiatives of public, private and voluntary sectors for improving the agricultural economy of the district linking the NARS with the extension system and farmers.

ICAR Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK), CARD, Pathanamthitta

Pathanamthitta district Krishi Vigyan Kendra, the Knowledge and Resource Centre of Indian council of Agriculture Research (ICAR), Govt of India is hosted by CARD. The aim is to transfer advanced agricultural technologies to the farming community of the district. KVK acts as a bridge between research organisations and farmers to solve the local issues in agriculture and allied fields.

KVK has been supporting the farming community on technology backstopping in Agriculture and allied filed since its inception on 25th March 1995. Dr C.P Robert working as Senior Scientist and Head of ICAR-KVK, CARD, Pathanamthitta.

TRAININGS -2021-22

Pathanamthitta Krishi Vigyan Kendra organized a total of 141 training 4389 participants including 2609 males and 1780 females benefitted from the training programmes. During the period KVK conducted 7 On-Farm Tastings with 33 trials and 11 Front Line Demonstrations with 77 demonstrations. 778 extension activities organized to benefit 12619 farmers and stakeholders. KVK produced and distributed 111162 nos. planting materials and 14588 kg. bioproducts.

ENTREPRENEUR SUPPORT CENTRE (ESC) AT KVK CAMPUS

Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Pathanamthitta opens up the Entrepreneur Support Centre (ESC), KVK's third marketing outlet and a unique nutritive hub for small entrepreneurs that ensures the delivery of nutritious, healthy and wholesome products to its customers. The center is





initiated as part of the project "Attracting and Retaining Youth in Agriculture" (ARYA) of Govt. of India. The ESC was inaugurated by Rt.Rev.Thomas Mar Timotheos Episcopa, Chairman, ICAR-KVK, Pathanamthitta. The ESC would strengthen the market of the value-added products of small entrepreneurs and also capacity development programmes are organized for entrepreneurs in the areas of product manufacturing, packaging, labelling, branding and registration. The uniqueness of the market mechanism is that individual entrepreneur decides on the selling price of their products and at the same time quality of the products is monitored by KVK. Entrepreneurs. Those registered with ESC only shall be allowed to sell their produce. It is also ensured that every product brought to ESC is produced by the entrepreneur himself following Good Manufacturing Practices (GMP). Registered entrepreneurs are also issued an Identity Card by KVK, which ensures the quality of marketed products.

7. LIVELIHOOD ACTIVITIES

The objective of the Livelihood Program is to reduce poverty and inequality by generating employment among poor households and by moving highly vulnerable households into sustainable livelihoods and toward economic stability.

CARD has been focusing on livelihood promotion programs with the motive of increasing employment opportunities for rural women and youth as follows.

Production cum Training units

- i. CARD Mar Thoma Vocational Training Centre, Haripad
- ii. CARD Better Home, Thiruvalla
- iii. CARD Pampa Umbrellas, Thulapally

CARD - Mar Thoma Vocational Training Centre, Haripad

CARD started this unit in 1990 to provide vocational training to economically weaker youth. The centre is functioning at Haripad in the Alappuzha District of Kerala. Training in Tailoring and embroidery is imparted here. The unit raises its income through the manufacturing and sale of major products like furniture, communion syrup, candle, wafer, squash and a tailoring center under the unit.











CARD Better Home, Thiruvalla

CARD Better Home is a unit working in Thiruvalla since 1999 for women's employment. The center is providing training on cross stitching, hand embroidery and machine embroidery. Tailoring training was not held this year due to covid-19 pandemic. Kaappa, Virikoot, Chithola, Thirasseela, Kuppayam etc. used for church worship are manufactured and sold in the unit.

CARD Pampa Umbrellas, Thulappally

This unit was started in the year of 1999 as a training unit for Umbrella making. Five women have been working in this unit as piece rate-wise. During the reporting year, 250 Gents (Wooden) umbrellas and 680 Twofold Umbrella have manufactured.







8. GOVERNMENT PROGRAMMES

i. PMKSY (Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana) Programme



The objective of PMKSY is to achieve convergence of investments in irrigation at the field level, expand cultivable area under assured irrigation, improve onfarm water use efficiency to reduce wastage of water, and enhance the adoption of precision-irrigation and other water-saving technologies (More crop per drop), enhance recharge of aquifers and introduce sustainable water conservation practices by exploring the feasibility of reusing treated municipal waste water for peri-urban agriculture and attract greater private investment in the precision irrigation system.

This scheme is under Govt. of India for water conservation. In the reporting year, 125 well recharge units were installed as per the budget of Mallappally Block Panchayath in Kallooppara Vadakkekkara, Keezhvaipur and Panayambala watershed areas.

ii. CRECHE Programme, Chungathara, Malappuram Dist.



3 creches have been functioning in Chungathara, Malappuram District. The operations of the creches, which were stopped due to the spread of Covid-19 in the last two years, reopened in February 2022. The programme is supported by the Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS). Now 57 students were studying in 3 centres as follows.



Andikkunnu 22
 Uppada 18
 Anakallu 17

One worker and helper working in each centre. 90 per cent of running costs are met by ICDS and the remaining by Mar Thoma Mission complex, Uppada.

9. RURAL MARKETING

CARD, Gramolpannam, Thiruvalla

CARD Gramolapannam Showroom was started in Thiruvalla in 1992 for the marketing of rural products. The main selling products of the unit are honey, handicrafts, church materials, Christmas star, bamboo products, cotton, khadi products and Ayurvedic products of Kerala Sarvodaya.



A Photostat unit also functions under this unit.

10. CARD GRAMASAKTHI- SOCIETY

Gramasakthi is a registered society of CARD for the marketing of rural products manufactured by CARD and other CBOs. Notebooks, bags, umbrellas, Honey, and Bio Gas Plant are the main products of Gramasakthi Society.



11. RURAL PRODUCTS PROMOTION PROGRAMME (RPPP)

Due to globalization and its effects, the products produced in villages were facing tight competition from rival competitors. To overcome this situation, CARD has introduced a new programme called the Rural Product Promotion Programme (RPPP) on 2021. The main ob-









jective of CARD through RPPP was to get a market opportunity for the village entrepreneurs through which they can sell their quality products to the prospective people at a reasonable price, thereby improving the standard of the society as a whole.

The main products which are dealt through RPPP are pure honey, Fresh Farm products, School Educational kit, Holy communion products, waste management incinerator, Biogas plant installation, sale of wood products, handicraft items etc. and almost around 100 other different products in total.

12. DISASTER MANAGEMENT

Flood and Covid-19 disaster relief assistance



In December 2021, Utility kits containing kitchen utensils and mattresses were distributed to 50 families that suffered from landslides and floods in Kokkayar Panchayat of the Idukki district.

Rt. Rev. Dr Gregorios Mar Stephanos Episcopa inaugurated the distribution of the kit containing 15 products worth Rs.8000 per family.

CARD INDIA Member of actalliance

CARD has distributed food kits and hygiene kits to 300 families, including children of Anaparampal Girls High School, Kunnam MarThoma Higher Secondary School and children of the fifth ward of Niranam Panchayat in the Upper Kuttanad region. Tarpaulin sheets, mats, bed sheets, food kits and kits worth Rs. 2500 were distributed to 50 tribal families living in forest areas of Chalakayam, Plapalli and Laha in Sabarimala ward of Ranni -Perunad Panchayat.

CARD-Act Alliance Covid-19 Support

COVID-19 has underscored the crucial need for pandemic responses to include social protection measures that reach and benefit marginalized populations.

As the pandemic swept across India in early 2020, the region was already grappling with socioeconomic distress and humanitarian crises. Social restrictions imposed to contain the pandemic exacerbated those challenges. Covid-19 prevention activities under the leadership of the Christian Agency for Rural Development, in collaboration with the act alliance, were inaugurated by Rt. Rev.Thomas Mar Timotheus Episcopa at MarThoma Higher Secondary School, Kunnam. The project titled, **Karuthal Sparsham**, provided unconditional financial assistance to families affected by covid. The scheme is to provide Rs 6000 to families affected by Covid. The amount was deposited in the account of the woman the head of the family. According to the project criteria, 320 selected families from places such as Kunnam MarThoma School, Attathodu, Chalakayam, Laha, Vijayapuram Puthuparamb in Vechuchira, Perunad & Vijayapuram Panchayath have benefited from the project.



CARD has distributed hygiene kits to 215 children of Kunnam Mar Thoma Higher Secondary School.

Working since March 2020 on COVID-19 prevention activities, CARD focused on awareness and relief activities to prevent the spread of covid. To every needy strata of the society, food kits and Hygiene kits were distributed as a primary level of prevention.

CARD Gramasakthi CFCD (Child Focused Community Development) Project, Kalahandi, Odisha

Major achievements of the project

I. Health & Nutrition

- The people, especially the children of Samagaon and Napadulu villages are getting portable water.
- The community people were taught about good sanitary conditions and most are practising institutional delivery.
- There is an increase in institutional delivery.

II. Education & Skill Development

- The children from the rural area were able to improve their inner talent through cultural and sports events.
- Village's leaders participated in the community development programme and there is cooperation by the local Govt. officials for village development.

Livelihood was affected due to the pandemic situation and lockdown. For a long,

- CBOs members are actively participating in all development work of their respective villages.
- The target groups knew the PRI system properly and they gained awareness regarding different govt. Schemes.
- The people from the project area started doing kitchen garden and they are now able to consume fresh vegetables.

V. Children in Governance

- The Child parliament (CP) members are taking responsibility for themselves to educate more people about child rights.
- The community people and parents are educated about the child's rights and protection policy and they are working accordingly.

VI. Protection and Conservation of Environment:

- The community people are aware of climate change and its impact on the community. Accordingly, they are trying to take precautions for the future.
- The community people are protecting natural resources and using them properly.

VIII. Disaster response programme (COVID -19 Mitigation programme

The CARD Gram Shakti CFCD Project, Kalahandi is working in the rural belts of Odisha, situated in a remote area and the community is so far from the govt. benefits in time. The target community was most affected during the second wave of COVID-19 in comparison to the first wave. The project printed IEC material for giving awareness of COVID -19 and use that material in all the villages.

Awareness Programme on COVID-19

- Community was motivated and given awareness to take the vaccine.
- Frequent Hand wash with soap. Especially after coming back home, after the use of toilets, before and after having food etc.
- Maintain social distance from people outside.
- Usage of the mask if at all anyone from the house is going out.
- Maintain cleanliness near and around their home and surroundings and also maintain good personal hygiene.
- The Children and Elderly are more vulnerable to this pandemic and hence need to take utmost care in this situation.

- The community people and children participated in all the training and awareness programmes conducted by the project and they tried to apply gained knowledge for their betterment.
- VDC is giving leadership in their respective villages and they also help the project in the process of planning, execution, monitoring and selection of beneficiaries.
- While implementing any activities stakeholders are contributing their effort in terms of cash to make it a success.
- The entire project formed CBOs are working for their own and community development, especially women SHGs.
- Youth of the target villages also participate in the village development programme.



CARD Light to Life project aims the holistic development of the children in Rural India. The project works in 7 states in India with 8 projects and 1100 students and their families. Eight projects will have a different project centre where children will attend after school and holiday classes.

Vision: Light to Life aims at Social Transformation and Development of communities through the holistic development of children.

Project Design: The project is designed to support education, provide nutritious food and sufficient clothing, it creates congenial environment for emotional, social and spiritual growth of the less privileged children.

• Educational Development

The aim of the Educational Development is to support the ongoing children in School of Eight projects. We support 1100 students directly for education. The major activities under Educational development are continuous support to education for rural children /unprivileged children.

Physical Development

The aim of the physical development is to address the malnutrition among children and strengthen the physical health of children in rural area.

Value Biased Education

The Light to Life Project focused the increase in the value of their life and society. Values always develop the growth in childhood and it reflects in his /her life through out.

Socio-cultural Learning

Light to life focuses the children's emotional problems; It includes counselling, extracurricular activities, coping up with stress counselling for students and parents.



Second wave of Covid-19

It has been more than a year and a half since the COVID-19 pandemic penetrated the deepest core of human civilization and made us realizes the power of Mother Nature. The second wave started in the west with Maharashtra, went up North and now is peaking in the south of the country. This spread journey makes a national lockdown economically suboptimal. The pandemic posed several challenges in public and private schools which included an expected rise in dropouts, learning losses, and increase in digital divide. The Light to Life teachers helped the students and parents to operate these kinds of platforms. The pandemic caused further shocks to the system with schools forced to shut down during the lockdown period and the transition of students and teachers to online teaching-learning.

Project Activities

Educational Support, Meal for a Day, Hygiene kit distribution, Hygiene Practices for children, Health screening for Children, community awareness programme, Child Protection Programs, Road Safety awareness Programmes. Observation of International Days Counselling session for students and their families. Covid 19 Mitigation Program, tailoring class & sewing machine distribution for Parents and students, registration in Co-win App for vaccination, House Visits for creating awareness IGP programme for parents, Vegetable Gardening etc.

Project wise programme at a Glance

I. Ameri Light to Life, BILASPUR, Chattisgraph

Ameri Light to life is situated in Ameri Village, which is in the outskirts of the suburb of Bilaspur city. It is a joint venture by CARD Light To Life and Mar Thomma Mission Board. The Ameri Light to Life was started with 150 children and 6 staff under CARD Light to Life program in 23rd October 2017. Ameri village comes under Bilaspur district in Chhattisgarh State, where most of the people are Scheduled caste, backward, illiterate and uneducated. Their standard of living is very poor and also they are poor in literacy and weak in health and hygiene. We have strength of 150 children .

- Kitchen Garden program for children.
- The community empowerment program was done by the project.
- 36 members are currently enrolled and classes conducted. Government officers were invited and organised an E-labour card awareness classes for community people & parents.
- Children also given various skill trainings in project like embroidery & design stitching and also door mat & envelope making.

COVID-19 Relief work:

Food kit was given for parents and children from the project in the month of August, September, January and February after the second wave of COVID-19.

Parents visited the project centre during food kit distribution and were also given some awareness messages about COVID-19 and prevention.

Project staff even visited the children houses whenever possible and created awareness on vaccination and how to be careful in the prevention of COVID-19 in the neighbourhood.

II. CARD Light to Life Projects, Kalhandi, ODISHA

The Kalahandi Light to Life Project is working for the Holistic development of 150 students through 2 centres in Turlakhaman and Lubangarh villages. The area where the project is situated is amidst the rural belt and interior forests. The people here are tribal's , poor and are living with minimal facilities. The parents of 150 students in the project are mostly marginal farmers or daily wage labourers.







Major Achievements

- The project organized 7 parents and teachers meeting in Two centers.
- The project conducted two cultural programmes for children.
- Staff capacity building training was conducted.
- The project conducted two annual sports meet.
- The project conducted five training on personality and leadership development for project children.
- Three days hand craft training for project children.
- Conducted awareness programmes on different social issues to the community and project target families.

DISASTER RESPONSE PROGRAM/ COVID MITIGATION

Awareness were given to the parents to take COVID -19 vaccine, using of sanitizer, mask and distance with others. With support of HCDI the project distributed dry food kit three times to project families as well as community. Through this programme 200 poorest families were benefited.

III. CARD Light to life Project, Kshipra, Madhya Pradesh

Kshipra (suklya) is a Village in Dewas Tehsil in Dewas District of Madhya Pradesh State, India. It belongs to Ujjain Division. This Place is in the border of the Dewas District and Indore DistrictIndore District Sanwer is west towards this place Demographics of Kshipra (suklya) Bhil (malvia)is the Local Language here. The main language of this place are Bhil and Hindi, Devanagiri. The kumbhmela festivals are celebrating on the bank of this river at Ujjain. Supporting for 200 children in the project. There are 102 girls and 98 boys enrolled.

V. CARD Light To Life Project, Sapera, Hariyana

The Sapera is a Hindu Caste found in North India. They are also known as Barwa Sapera in West Bengal, Sapera in Punjab and Sapera in Madhya Pradesh. They are a community of snake charmers and one among a number of semi-nomadic communities in North India which live in camps at the outskirts of most North Indian towns. In Hariyana, the community is known as the Sapera Nath. They now have scheduled caste status in Hariyana. This project was inaugurated on February, 2018 100 children were benefited.







Major Activities.

- 100 food kits was received from HCDI and distributed in December
- We were given medicine and after recovery we were given a sanitation kit.
- The Balasamajam program was started to develop leadership skills in children. Two of the children are chosen to look after the whole week.
- 10th exam and course certificates and prizes were given to the twenty-five students who completed the sewing class.
- Extra classes started for 10th class students.
- Exam preparation classes for high school children.
- The literacy class started in January as per the requirement of the adults.

VI. CARD Light to Life Project, Sengottai, Tamilnadu

The Project started at Shenkottai on 26-October-2018. At the beginning stage, Project started at Kalangathakandy village with 50 children. New children were added from village Vishwanathapuram and Kattalakudiyiruppu to the project. Now, the total counting of the students is 100 (52 boys and 48 girls). From Shenkottai (Vishwanathapuram) total number of students - 61, Kalangathakandy total number of students - 24 and Kattalakudiyiruppui total number of students - 15. The total strength of students is 100.

VII. CARD Light to Life Project, VATTAVADA, Kerala

Vattavada is the border village of Kerala state situated 45 km away from Munnar. On 14th December 2017, Light to life project was started at Vattavada. The community of Vattavada are migrant groups from Tamil nadu. People of Vattavada finds their major share of livelihood through agriculture. Presently there are 250 children.

- To fill the academic gap with conducted online classes.
- At the time of pandemic, worked with health department.
- Conducted career guidance programme. Make awareness about online chatting and its impacts.
- Conducted an essay writing competition to high school students.
- Develop their talents and skills through talent search.
- To enhance empowerment of girl child.

VIII. CARD Light to Life Project, Wayand, Kerala

CARD Light to Life project was started functioning from April 2018. The office functioning at Nadavayal which is a small town situated amidst the famous towns of Sulthan Bathery and Kalpetta in Wayanad district, Kerala, India. The number of project children are 100.







Major Activities

- started 2 smart tuition center at Pannickal and Kavadom.
- Lack of knowledge in reading Malayalam fluently in our tuition centres. We are making them available modern tools for easy learning. This method (using smart TV) is very helpful to the students for their study. 34 tribal children are studying in this centers.

- Onam programme organized in two days in google meet. The name of the programme was "Akannirikkam.. veettilirunnu onam koodam" (Keep the distance... Onam can be celebrated at home)


- The project started a You Tube channel named Jeevitha Velicham inaugurated by Mr. Y Thanakachen (Finance coordinator, HCDI).



The SRC has developed many innovative process protocols and installed the latest food processing machinery to cater for the needs of the emerging food processing sector. An exclusive Webinar on "Role of FSSAI Registration and Licensing in ensuring food safety and Good Health" was organised by the State Resource Center for Jackfruit of ICAR-Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Pathanamthitta.

STRY is aimed at imparting skill-based training to rural youth on agri-based vocational areas in agriculture & allied areas to promote employment in rural areas and for the creation of skilled manpower to perform farm and non-farm operations. Skills on Planting material production, Vegetable seedling production, production and use of Biopesticides/bio fertilisers, IPM and INM in field crops and vegetables and various marketing strategies were taught during the programme. A total of 23 youths were trained as part of the programme.



III. FISH HARVEST MELA AT KVK FARM

KVK organised a Fish harvest meal on 23rd September from the KVK farm pond. Carps like Rohu, Catla and GIFT (Chitralada) were harvested. Catla fish of 7.5 kg was the attraction of the day.



IV. SPECIAL SWACHHTA CAMPAIGN

As part of the Special Swachhta Campaign of ICAR, Govt. of India, KVK conducted a cleanliness programme, where KVK staff along with the public including members of civil society and farmers cleaned the premises of a Covid care center at Ezhamattoor Panchayat. As part of the campaign KVK also organized a farmers' seminar on the theme "Waste from Wealth". The programme also included awareness of vermicomposting.

V. AWARENESS PROGRAMME AMONG FARMERS FOR USING ENERGY-EFFICIENT PUMP SETS AND WATER RESOURCE EFFICIENCY

ICAR-Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Pathanamthitta organised an awareness programme among farmers for using energy-efficient pump sets and water resource efficiency in collaboration with Energy Management Centre (State Designated Agency to enforce Energy Conservation Act 2001), Department of Power, Govt. of Kerala, Thiruvananthapuram at Kodumon Panchayat of Parakode Block in Pathanamthitta district. The programme was inaugurated by Mr Ijas, M.A, Energy Technologist-B (DSM), EMC, Thiruvananthapuram Mr Suresh Babu, B.V, Energy Auditor and Mr Vinod Mathew, Sub-



ject Matter Specialist (Agronomy), ICAR-Krishi Vigyan Kendra, CARD, Pathanamthitta served as resource persons in the programme. A total of 67 farmers participated in the awareness programme.

VI. ANIMAL HEALTH CAMP

KVK organised an Animal health camp at the Peringara panchayat. The programme was organised in collaboration with the Grama panchayath and the veterinary dispensary, Peringara. 137 farmers participated in the programme. The animal health camp could cover 394 numbers of animals including dairy cows, buffaloes, goats and poultry. Two tonnes of fodder were also distributed among the farmers in the flood-affected areas.

VII. INTERACTIVE WORKSHOP FOR ATTRACTING YOUTH IN AGRICULTURE

ICAR- KVK, CARD, and Pathanamthitta organized 4 Interactive Workshops on *Opportunities for Youth In Agriculture* for attracting youth in agriculture to different colleges in the district as part of the project "Attracting and Retaining Youth in Agriculture (ARYA) funded by ICAR, Govt. of India. The workshops aimed at creating awareness among the youth on entrepreneurship opportunities in agriculture and allied sectors. A total of 720 students participated in the workshops.

VIII. JAI JAWAN JAI KISAN Theme: Uttam Kheti-Unnat Kisan



As part of the programme Jai Jawan Jai Kisan, KVK organized various programmes on the theme "Uttam Kheti-Unnat Kisan". On the occasion, harvest Mela was organized. The harvesting of the Paddy Var. Manuratna was inaugurated by Sri. K.K Sreedharan, President, Kodumon Panchayat and was presided over by Sri. Thulasidharan Pillai, President, Parakode block Panchayath. Dr. C.P Robert, Senior Scientist and Head, ICAR-KVK, Pathanamthitta delivered the keynote address.

KVK also organized a Seminar on the topic "Scope of Mushroom farming", an Exhibition and Training programme on the topic "Organic farming and Eco-friendly technologies" and "Egger Nursery Management" for the farming community in the district.

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IX. NUTRI-GARDEN PROGRAMME TO BRIDGE THE NUTRITIONAL GAP BETWEEN WOMEN AND CHILDREN

KVK, Pathanamthitta launched the Nutri-garden programme for bridging the nutritional gap between women and children in Koipuram village in the district. A total of 120 families from 12 Anganwadies in the village covering 185 women and 210 children below the age group of 15 years benefitted from the programme. During this Covid -19 pandemic period, it is observed that many of the Anganwadi households are mainly dependent on food supplements received from the PDS system, which is deficient in fresh fruits and vegetables. Hence to ensure optimum nutrition for these families, an exclusive household package with a microgreen kit was distributed among the selected families. The microgreens, nutrient-packed greens ensure nutritional security with little investment and effort in terms of time and energy. The beneficiaries were also given training regarding the cultivation and use of microgreens.

IMPORTANT DAYS CELEBRATIONS

A. CELEBRATION OF INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF MILLETS-CURTAIN RAISER THROUGH NUTRI GARDEN AND TREE PLANTATION CAMPAIGN

The Government of India has declared 2018 as the National Millets Year. In line with this, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations has decided to celebrate 2023 as the International Year of Millets. The curtain was raised on September 17th 2021 to mark the International Year of Millets at KVK in collaboration with Indian Farmers Fertilizer Co-Operative Ltd. (IFFCO). As part of the programme, Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Pathanamthitta organized the Poshan Maa programme, tree plantation campaigns and an Exhibition on Millets. On the occasion, ion technical session on the cultivation of millets and their nutritional values were also organised. 1000 Vegetable seedlings, 200 fruit saplings and 100 vegetable seeds packets were distributed to farmers.





B. WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY

KVK celebrated World Environment Day. As part of the programme, a webinar on the theme "Resetting ourselves with nature during Covid 19 pandemic" was organized. The lead talk was delivered by Sri. Varghese C Thomas, Asst. Editor, Malayala Manorama, Pathanamthitta. Rev. Abraham P.Varkey, Director, CARD inaugurated the programme. On the occasion, a Tree planting campaign was also organised. A total of 72 farmers including 39 male and 33 female participated in the programme.



C. MAHILA KISSAN DIWAS

KVK celebrated Mahila Kissan Diwas on 15th October 2021. As part of the programme Cookery class for the members of Kaveri Self Help Group and KVK staff was organized for creating awareness of the importance of Nutrient rich snacks. The class was led by Ms Gipty Mohan, Project Manager, State Resource Centre (SRC) for Jackfruit of KVK. On the occasion, a farmers seminar on the theme "Equity and Empowerment" was also organized to create awareness among women on the importance of being equal and empowered in society for achieving transformational economic, environmental and social changes required for sustainable development. As part of the programme KVK also honoured 3 women, Smt. Anu John, Smt.Usha Joy and Smt. Shoba Ravindran to mark their contributions in the field of agriculture development. A total of 65 people participated in the two programmes being organised as part of the celebration.

D. WORLD FOOD DAY

KVK Pathanamthitta celebrated World Food day with the title theme "Our actions are our future – better production, better nutrition for a better environment and a better life". On the occasion, an online training programme on "Millets – Crops for Good Health, Nutritional Security and Climate Resilience" was organized for Anganwadi workers and women beneficiaries of Koipuram Block

E. WORLD SOIL DAY CELEBRATION

ICAR-KVK, Pathanamthitta celebrated World Soil day for the year 2021 in collaboration





with Vechoochira Grama panchayat and Krishi Bhavan. The programme was inaugurated by Adv. Pramod Narayanan MLA. On the occasion, he distributed soil health cards to the farmers of the panchayat. The soil health cards are prepared based on the analysis of soil samples collected from different clusters of selected panchayats with the concept of the grid method of soil sampling. Soil health cards are to be distributed to all the farmers having holdings in that grid. As part of promoting the significance of soil sample analysis in agriculture, KVK Pathanamthitta launched the 'Soil Health Campaign at the district level'. The objective of the programme was to cover 2 wards from each selected panchayat in the Pathanamthitta district.

This award is instituted by the Protection of Plant Varieties and Farmers Right Authority under Government of India. Mr. Reii was nominated for the award by District ICAR Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Pathanamthitta. He is one of the best farmers of Krishi Vigyan Kendra who implements the knowledge, technical services and expert suggestions in his farm.

He is passionate about preserving traditional varieties of tuber crops, turmeric, banana, ginger, etc. and experimenting with new ones in his two acre farm.Mr. Reji has received many

awards and accolades.. In 2013, he received the Limka Book Award for the tallest colocassia and the longest lady's finger. Pathanamthitta District Krishi Vigyan Kendra certified the required agricultural products as authentic. He has also acquired national recognitions for the production of 5 kg of tuber and 18.38 kg of turmeric from single plant. His passion is to preserve and propagate plant species with diverse characteristics like Peruvilathil Kachil, Katua Kyyan Neela Angamali, Nurun adichipuzha, Tapioca variety Kanthari Padappan, Prakriti Manjal, Gajendra Chena, Ginger varieties Varada, Angamoozhi and Reodi. Apart from this, the farmer is very keen to try and succeed many innovative ideas in the farm like wick irrigation, mini set technology in tuber varieties, pseudo stem technology to increase the efficiency of irrigation etc.







CASE STUDY



THE LOVING TOUCH OF CARE

Kokkayar Panchayat is a village which falls under Peerumed Block of Idukki Dist. The village saw a massive devastation as a result of the floods and landslides 2021.In the aftermath of floods, CARD response team conducted a rapid need assessment at the Meloram & Attoram colony in Kokkayar Panchayat. It is home to 80 families.

Mr. Pappu a resident of the colony works as a daily labourer. Pappu a Kokkayar resident, said they have been living in the area for the last 63 years and never faced such incident. The families lost their livelihood, kitchen materials, furniture and damage houses.

They had got a warning by the government to vacate the area. They were made to stay in the relief camps for 10 days. The essential food and clothing were provided by the center itself.

After reaching back to their house, they were shocked to see their own house as small part of the roof collapsed, a snake was found, the books, bag of the child got wet, utensils washed away, clothes were muddy, crack in the wall, furniture damaged Relief kit which included bedsheet, bucket, utensils and hygiene items were provided by CARD. His family felt blissed out as the required utensils and other household items have been provided to them.









The growth of technology in the modern century has brought about revolutionary changes in all spheres of our society. Advances in technology have led to many changes and innovations in the field of education.

A few years ago, classes were conducted using blackboards, textbooks, chalk, dusters, and maps. Learning outside the classroom was minimal as a result, children often became bored with learning or other learning activities.

In the modern education system, students are get more importance than teachers. Instead of lecture-style classes by teachers, emphasis is placed on student-centered classes. Today our children are experiencing technologies at their fingertips. Technology has had a huge impact on children's curricular and extracurricular activities. Today our children are highly desirous of technology-based knowledge.

This is where smart classrooms become smart among students. Smart classrooms put an end to boring classes by making learning simple and fun with modern learning tools.





Since 2018, CARD Light to Life Project has started 8 tuition centers at various locations for tribal children belonging to 15 colonies in Wayanad. The tribal children who only speak their own language at home had difficulty in reading and writing Malayalam and other languages. Here, learning was done through traditional methods.

During the lockdown period the children spoke only the tribal language, because they had no opportunities to interact with other languages.

When the tuition centre started again after the covid, it was noticed that most of the children are not fluent in Malayalam. In this situation we thought about making the learning center become smart.

Pannikal of Pulpally Grama panchayath and Kavadam of Kaniyambetta Gramapanchayath have started tuition classes smartly on pilot basis.

Learning started with the help of videos, animated clips and internet through smart TV. This was a new experience for the children. 36 tribal children are studying here. Teachers testify that children pay more attention to their studies and other learning activities. Thus learning becomes fun and enjoyable.
